# Open Education Faculty Innovators

These faculty members have freed themselves from commercial textbooks and are providing exceptional learning opportunities using alternative learning methods in their courses. Together, Beshwate and King saved students in their courses over \$8,000 during spring semester!

## Ben Beshwate, History

"For years I have been looking for an appropriate textbook for my Modern Western Civilization class (HIST C104). Nothing on the market was adequate, but I continued to use the available textbooks with no other resources available. When I was approached by Professor Sharlene Paxton about OER I was quickly interested. We worked on a series of open resources, and the result is a "book" I can use in my course that is not only better than any textbook on the market today, but is also of no cost to the student. This has been a win-win for both myself and my students of HIST C104."

## Sarah King, Anthropology

"Native Peoples of North America was a brand new class, so it seemed like a good opportunity to try an OER. The overall experience was a positive one. The students had access to the textbook from the first day. There was none of the usual lag in preparedness as students waited for financial aid checks to arrive in order to purchase books. I don't have hard data on it, but it seemed like more students were keeping up with the reading throughout the semester as well. It was so successful that I decided to use OERs in my Intro to Sociology and Physical Anthropology courses in the future."
