
Cerro Coso Community College Ethnicity Trends 2006-7 to 2011-12

Over a relatively short period of time, there has been at least one demographic trend of note in the changing student body at Cerro Coso. A steady increase in Latino /Hispanic students from 14.2% in 2006-7 to 26.1% in 2011-12 represents a 88% increase!


Upon closer examination, this increase seems strongly linked to online enrollments from the Bakersfield service area, and linked to low enrollment intensity in those student enrollments. (Students from Bakersfield are taking very few units).

Another change has emerged in the increase in students selecting Two or More races. The number of students selecting this option has increased 386% from 74 to 360. The growth in these areas represents increases in ethnic diversity, with online populations most affected. From 2008-2011 Latino online enrollments increased 61.1% with the biggest jump in the fall 2009 to fall 2010.



Cerro Coso Commuity College Student Socio-Economic Status (SES) 2012

Socio-economic status (SES) is commonly thought as a product of income, education, and occupation. Parental education and household income are often used as measures of college student SES. Educational attainment is strongly related to wealth and household income, and SES is strongly related to educational attainment.


In Spring 2012, Cerro Coso administered a survey that gathered a large enough sample of data from which to make some generalizations. Household income and detailed parental education information was gathered. In the first graphic below, nearly one-third of respondants reported income levels below \$10k¹. More than half (54.7%) reported incomes below \$30K.

Differences in student income by campus was very evident. Online students had the largest response rate and this increases in our confidence in generalizing the data for online students. Nearly half (48.4%) of online students were below \$30K, 26% were in middle income groups, while 27.6% were in the upper income brackets. More than half of the main campus students (55.8%) were in the lower bracket, a fifth were in the middle brackets, and a quarter (24.1%) were in the upper brackets. At KRV the majority of students (89.5%) are in the lowest groups, with nearly 60% with household incomes below \$10K. Household income levels at the last three campuses are not dissimilar to the main campus, however, the lower responses rates from students at those campuses must be interpreted with more caution in making assumptions about students at those campuses.

Income is strongly related to educational attainment. Researchers have long noted the relationship between income and parental educational level on the educational attainment of their children. A robust body of evidence on the college outcomes of the offspring of parents who have not obtained a bachelors have refined our understanding of "first generation" student behavior.


First Generation & 2011 Household Income Level

One of the most significant pieces of information to emerge from the 2012 Student Experience Survey is the identification of first generation students. The evolving evidence on first generation effects on prospective, beginning and continuing students offer nuanced explanations of first generation students as they interact at Cerro Coso. Significant and consistent group differences have been found in student behaviors or outcomes (study-time, retention, persistence, full-time enrollment, engagement, etc.) in different studies linked to different shades of first generation status.

First generation status is often something of a proxy for social class and is commonly linked to socio-economic status which is a feature of income, education and occupation. It has been found in many studies to explain differences in college going and college performance behaviors. First generation students are often older, attend part time, work part- or full-time while attending, often supporting families.


The spring 2012 Student Experience Survey allowed the first-ever collection of this information for Cerro Coso, as well as household income. Overall it appears that nearly three-quarters of Cerro Coso students can be classified as first generation. The chart below shows the first generation rate by campus; most campuses host a majority of first generation students. The rates for the three last campuses must be interpreted cautiously owing to smaller response rates from students at those campuses.

Low income students at Cerro Coso are much more likely to be first generation. Continuing generation students are more evenly distributed across income levels. Number of responses are indicated along trendlines.

In this first topic brief from the recently conducted **Student Experience Survey**, results provided information on first generation students at Cerro Coso for the first time. More than 700 responses were collected in the survey; 653 students provided information about parental education which informs student first generation status.

First generation students are typically first in their family to go to college. Two decades of research have shown that the differences in student behavior and degree attainment extend to students whose parents had not achieved bachelor's degrees or higher. In study after study, even among students with the same income level, academic background, and motivation, first generation students "are at a somewhat greater risk of being academically, socially, and economically left behind" (Pascarella et. al. 2004).

Compared to students from higher educational level households, first generation students

- Chose less selective institutions, even when academic preparation was equalized
- Completed significantly fewer credit hours across a 3-year period
- Worked significantly more hours per week
- Had significantly lower GPAs
- Had lower levels of extracurricular involvement and interaction with peers in non-course contexts, which scholars indicate may put them at a disadvantage in the benefits received from postsecondary education.

Research scholars have attributed this difference to the family cultural capital, the attitudes and values informed by parents who have navigated the waters and can impart that knowledge throughout childhood.

The survey asked students to indicate the highest education level achieved by each parent and the responses were coded to the highest educational level achieved by one or both parents.

In the chart to the right two different definitions of first generation are illustrated. In the most conservative (and

oldest) definition, parents' highest education level is high school diploma or GED. The US Department of Education TRIO program uses a definition similar to Pascarella, where neither parent has achieved a Bachelor's Degree.


In the first chart, the educational levels are noted for the respondents claiming that campus as their main campus for the spring semester, 2012. The first generation educational level is noted in the shaded boxes following the groups they include. In the last column are the number of respondents in the survey from those campuses who answered the questions.

The results would seem to indicate a high first generation population for all campuses. Kern River Valley, the Ridgecrest campus, Bishop and Online are three-quarters or more first generation when using the TRIO definition.

The implications resonate with other observations about the Cerro Coso student body. First generation students are more likely to be part-time and take fewer units than non-first generation students. Cerro Coso hovers around 80% part-time, with a large portion taking fewer than three units.



Over the period of this self-study, there has been a decline in students without a high school credential, and increases in enrolled students who possess a HS diploma or passed the GED. In fact, the number of those enrolled who have received a HS diploma increased 26%¹ from 2006-7 to the year of peak enrollment at Cerro Coso, 2010-11. There have been declines in enrolled students who already have an AA or BA degree. The decline in this latter category has been rather profound--40%. This may be due to decreasing enrollments in physical education classes and other lifelong learning options for older populations in the past few years.
