ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE**ADMJ C101 Intro Administration of Justice**

A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This is a comprehensive course on the Criminal Justice System that includes the history and philosophy of the Administration of Justice in America. The course explores the development of the criminal justice system, including all sub-systems, interconnectivity of the sub-systems and their role expectations, theories on crime, adjudication, punishment, rehabilitation, education and training for the continued professionalism of the entire system. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ADMJ C105 Concepts of Criminal Law

A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

In this course students learn the historical development, philosophy, and constitutional provisions of the law and its impact within the criminal justice system. Students develop a working knowledge of legal terms and their definitions. Students look at the classification of crime and its causation. Students conduct analytical research and study of case law decisions.

ADMJ C111 Prin/Proced of Justice System

A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This course surveys and studies the role and responsibilities of each segment within the justice system; including, but not limited to law enforcement, corrections and the judicial system. Legal processes including arrest through trial, sentencing and correctional procedures. Conceptual interpretations of law as reflected in court decisions and how they impact the justice system. Advisory Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ADMJ C121 Community Relations

A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This course studies the factors that create friction between community and the criminal justice agencies. Includes the roles of Administration of Justice practitioners and agencies interrelationships and role expectations among various agencies and the public. Principal emphasis is placed upon the professional image of the criminal justice system and the development of the positive relationships between members of the criminal justice system and the public. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ADMJ C125 Principles of Investigation

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course provides students with an introduction into the ethics and legalities of criminal investigations. Topics include: fundamentals of investigation; techniques of crime scene searches; and aspects in dealing with the public, specific knowledge necessary for handling crime scenes, interviews, evidence, surveillance, follow-up, technical resources and case preparation are also covered. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ADMJ C131 Juvenile Procedures

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This is a basic course in the sociological study of crime and its causes as it pertains to juvenile procedures and delinquency. Topics include organization, functions, and jurisdiction of juvenile agencies, processing and detention of juveniles; juvenile case disposition; juvenile status and court procedures. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ANTH C111 Cultural Anthropology
A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This course analyzes social and cultural factors of human behavior in the recent past and present. Students will compare and contrast cultural traditions, practices and beliefs, and discuss the associated environmental and social factors that shape human cultures. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ANTH C121 Physical Anthropology
A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This course examines humans as biological organisms from an evolutionary perspective. Areas covered include concepts, methods, findings, and issues in the study of the order primates, including relationships between fossil monkeys, apes and humans, and the significance of genetic diversity between modern populations. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

ART C101 Introduction to Art
A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

Introduction to Art provides the student with a general overview of art history, develops skills in the critical evaluation of art, and encourages the development of personal aesthetics. In addition, the student is given studio art experiences dealing with various studio media in order to reinforce the concepts presented. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 2, CSCI C070.

BIOLOGY

BIOL C141 Environmental Studies
A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This course is an introduction to environmental science as a branch of the sciences and its relations to the field of science including the scientific method. It explores human interactions with the environment and their consequences for living and nonliving systems. Topics include ecologic principles, environmental resources and ways of protecting these resources. Critical evaluation of environmental issues and problems is a focus of this course. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

BIOL C142 Environmental Studies Lab
A/UC/CSU 1.00 Unit
Corequisite: BIOL C141

This course is a hands-on introduction to environmental science as a branch of the sciences including the scientific method and its relation to the field of science. It focuses on experimental design, sampling methods, data gathering and analysis in the context of the environmental sciences. Lab, field, and computer tools will be used to study concepts such as natural selection, human population growth, climate change, and biodiversity. Critical evaluation of environmental issues, problems and policy is a focus of this course. Field trips required.

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

BSAD C100 Introduction to Business
A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This is a survey course introducing the nature and scope of business. Field of business that will be introduced include management, operations, ethics, human resources, marketing, information systems and accounting. This course is recommended as the first business course for all business majors. Advisory: Level 1 Reading, level 1 Writing.

BSAD C101 Financial Accounting

A/UC/CSU 4.00 Units

This course introduces transaction analysis and reporting accounting information. Students examine accounting theory and the procedures of the accounting cycle. Emphasis is on preparing financial statements and interpreting results. Advisory: Math Level 3, BSAD C072.

BSAD C102 Managerial Accounting

A/UC/CSU 4.00 Units

Prerequisite: BSAD C101

This course focuses on analyzing and reporting accounting data for use in management planning, control and decision-making. Students examine costs systems, manufacturing systems, budgeting, and financial statement preparation and analysis.

BSAD C110 Intro to Personal Finance

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course introduces students to the principles of personal financial management. Topics include budgeting, career decisions, tax structure, consumer credit, insurance and retirement, purchasing decisions, savings, and investment. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1, Math Level 2.

BSAD C141 Human Relations in Business

A/CSU 3.00 Units

Using a behavioral science approach, students gain an understanding of human relations in the business environment. Emphasis is placed on elements of job applications and job advancement, motivation, people-to-people relationships, effective communications, and techniques of leadership on the job. Case studies, experiential exercises, and projects are used to assist the students in understanding the material.

BSAD C155 Human Resource Management

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course introduces the principles and methods related to the effective use of human resources in organizations. Students will gain an understanding of human resources involved in recruitment, selection, and placement of employees with regards to training, experience, and abilities. Topics of total compensation, employee-management relations, and global human resources management are also covered. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1, Math Level 2.

BSAD C171 Introduction to Marketing

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course introduces the nature and scope of the marketing activity as demonstrated by an integrated, analytic, and practical study of marketing problems. Topics covered include: how to distribute and sell a product or idea; consumer behavioral patterns; strategy, planning, forecasting, and evaluation of the marketing process. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1, Math Level 2.

BSAD C212 International Business

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course provides a comprehensive overview of international business, including a global perspective of international trade, foreign investments, the impact on financial markets, international marketing, and the operation of multi-national corporations. BSAD C222 Problem Solving & Computer Applications in Mgmt

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course uses computer applications and critical thinking skills to solve real-world business problems. Students integrate the use of word processing, spreadsheet, database, presentation, add-in software, and Internet resources to manage data to solve problems. Emphasis is placed on the use of software tools and analysis and modeling techniques to manage and manipulate data sources for decision making. The course assumes prior successful experience with and knowledge of individual Microsoft Office computer application programs. Advisory: BSAD C100, CSCI C101, Level 2 Math, Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

BSAD C251 Principles of Mgmt & Org

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course covers the formal organization, its environment and structure. Elements of planning, decision making, organizing, staffing, leading, controlling, and evaluating are covered. Case studies, competency (experiential) exercises, and projects are used to develop managerial skills. This course is a "capstone" for business career students. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

BUSINESS OFFICE TECHNOLOGY

BSOT C127 MS PowerPoint

A/CSU 1.00 Unit

This is a hands-on microcomputer course designed to provide basic understanding of Microsoft PowerPoint. Topics to be covered include planning, creating, editing, viewing, and printing. This course prepares the student to take the core level Microsoft PowerPoint Office Users Specialist certification exam. Advisory: CSCI C121 and CSCI C070 or CSCI C101.

BSOT C131 Basic Computer Keyboarding

A/CSU 1.00 Unit

Co-requisite: CSCI C070

Learners are introduced to a microcomputer keyboard with an emphasis on learning and skill-building correct touch typing techniques for alphanumeric, symbol, and punctuation keys. A foundation for keyboarding speed and accuracy is developed. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1, CSCI C070.

BSOT C132 Inter Computer Keyboarding

A/CSU 1.00 Unit

Learners in this course build on a basic keyboarding foundation with correct touch typing techniques, including alphabetic, numeric, and symbol keyboarding as well as 10-Key numeric keypad. Skill-building includes introductory formatting of documents. Successful completion of this class will result in minimum keyboarding speed of 30 wpm net. Advisory: BSOT C131.

A/CSU 1.00 Unit

Skill-building includes formatting of documents and individualized remedial drills. Successful completion of this class will result in minimum keyboarding speed of 45 wpm net. Advisory: BSOT C132.

**CHDV C100 Prin/Prac of Teaching
Young Children**

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course provides an examination of the underlying theoretical principles of developmentally appropriate practices applied to programs and environments emphasizing the key role of relationships, constructive adult-child interactions and teaching strategies in supporting physical, social creative and intellectual development for all children. This course includes a review of the historical roots of early childhood programs and the evolution of the professional practices promoting advocacy, ethics and professional identity. Students may be required to observe children in a group setting. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CHDV C102 Materials and Curriculum

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course presents an overview of knowledge and skills related to providing appropriate curriculum and environments for young children from birth to age 6. Students will examine a teacher's role in supporting development and fostering the joy of learning for all young children using observation and assessment strategies emphasizing the essential role of play. An overview of content areas will include but not be limited to: language and literacy, social and emotional learning, sensory learning, art and creativity, math and science. Student may be required to observe children in a group setting. Advisory: CHDV C100, Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CHDV C106 Child Growth and Development

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course examines the major physical, psychosocial, and cognitive/language developmental milestones for children, both typical and atypical, from conception through adolescence. There will be an emphasis on interactions between maturational processes and environmental factors. While studying developmental theory and investigative research methodologies, students will observe children, evaluate individual differences and analyze characteristics of development at various stages. Advisory: CHDV C100, Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

A/CSU 3.00 Units

A/CSU 3.00 Units

Introduction to the laws, regulations, standards, policies and procedures and early childhood curriculum related to child health safety and nutrition. The key components that ensure physical health, mental health and safety for both children and staff identified along with the importance of collaboration with families and health professionals. Focus on integrating the concepts into everyday planning and program development for all children. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CHDV C125 Diversity in Education
A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course examines the development of social identities in diverse societies including theoretical and practical implications of oppression and privilege as they apply to young children, families, programs, classrooms, and teaching. Students will explore various classroom strategies, emphasizing culturally and linguistically appropriate anti-bias approaches supporting all children in becoming competent members of a diverse society. This course includes self-examination and reflection on issues related to social identity, stereotypes and bias, social and educational access, media and schooling. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CHDV C145 Language and Literature
A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course develops the skills of storytelling and story reading for all ages. Students may be required to observe children in a group setting. Advisory: One development course (CHDV C101, C105, or C107); Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

A/CSU 3.00 Units

CHDV C200 Observation and Assessment
A/CSU 3.00 Units

Prerequisite: 15 units of CHDV courses: CHDVC100, C102, C104, one developmental course (CHDV C105, C106 or C107); one curriculum course (CHDV C125, C145 or C149)

This course focuses on the appropriate use of assessment and observation strategies to document development, growth, plan, and learning to join with families and professionals in promoting children's success. Recording strategies, rating systems, portfolios, and multiple assessment tools are explored.

CHDV C203 Practicum - Field Experience

A/CSU 3.00 Units

Prerequisite: CHDV C; CHDV C102; CHDV C104; CHDV C125; CHDV C105 or C106 or C107; CHDV C145 or C149; and CHDV C200

A demonstration of developmentally appropriate early childhood teaching competencies under guided supervision. Students will utilize practical classroom experiences to make connections between theory and practice, develop professional behaviors, and build a comprehensive understanding of children and families. Child centered, play oriented approaches to teaching, learning, and assessment; and knowledge of curriculum content areas will be emphasized as student teachers design, implement and evaluate experiences that promote positive development and learning for all young children. Students work in a supervised field experience and are required to perform at least 54 hours of practicum work under the direct supervision of a Master Teacher (or someone who would qualify as a Master Teacher) in an instructor-approved infant/toddler or preschool program. School-age program placement is restricted to before and after school programs or kindergarten. Participation in a placement setting requires proof of tuberculosis (TB) clearance.

CHDV C205 Foundations of Infant Dev

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course will include a study of growth and development from conception to age 2 through an understanding of biology and environment on development. Emphasis will be placed on the appreciation of the interrelatedness of theory, research, and applications. This course will include research and evidence from field experience with children in a wide variety of environments. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

A/CSU 3.00 Units

This course provides information on how to implement quality programs for school-age children. Students learn assessment, planning, implementation, and evaluation of programs. Students use standards for quality school-age care to assess quality indicators in the areas of human relationships, indoor and outdoor environments, activities, health, nutrition, safety and administration. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

A/CSU 3.00 Units

Students are introduced to the principles, techniques and methods for the efficient administration of child development programs. Topics covered include: budgeting, personnel leadership and management, health and safety, facility design and layout, and regulations including Title 5 of the California Education Code, Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations and California Health & Safety Code. Students may be required to observe children in a group setting. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CHDV C252 Admin of Child Dev Programs II
A/CSU 3.00 Units
Prerequisite: 9 units of Child Development classes including CHDV C251

Child Development program administrators are managers responsible for providing oversight for all program operations, as well as leadership in child development and the greater community. This course emphasizes the principles, techniques, and methods for creating and maintaining a caring, cooperative workplace that respects human dignity, promotes professional satisfaction, and models positive relationships.

A/CSU 3.00 Units

The course addresses adult supervision and leadership in the Child Development profession. The course will provide background on leadership and the roles leaders assume using principles from business applied specifically to the business of child care and development. The course will provide step-by-step information and ideas for an effective supervisory program with special attention to staff orientation. Finally, the course will explore the leader's role as change agent and professional. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

CSCI C070 Computer Literacy
A 1.00 Unit

This hands-on course is designed for those with little or no computer experience. Learners practice file management, email, instant messaging, Internet browsing and searching. This course includes a brief introduction to industry standard word processing, spreadsheet, and presentation application programs. Computer terminology and identification of fundamental hardware and software applications is introduced. Advisory: Reading Level 2.

CSCI C101 Intro to Computer Info Systems
A/UC/CSU 3.00 Units

This survey class introduces the learner to uses of computers in business and society through exploration of hardware, software, file management, networks, digital media, the Internet, web page creation and business software. Context and issues related to the computer industry as well as information systems and design are presented. Projects include writing and presenting on a relevant topic utilizing business software and research skills developed in class. Advisory: CSCI C070, Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CSCI C121 Beginning Word
A/CSU 1.00 Unit

This course begins preparation for the core level Microsoft Office Specialist certification exam for Microsoft Word. Advisory: CSCI C070, Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1.

CSCI C123 Beginning Excel
A/CSU 1.00 Unit

This hands-on computer course is designed to provide a basic understanding of spreadsheets. Spreadsheet design, creation, revision, formatting and printing are covered. The learner will create basic sales or expense reports, family budgets and basic business related spreadsheet documents using Microsoft Excel features and functions. This course begins preparation for the Microsoft Application Specialist certification exam for Excel. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 1, CSCI C070.

A/CSU 1.00 Unit

This hands-on computer course is designed to provide an intermediate understanding of database programs. This course begins preparation for the core level Microsoft Access Office Specialist certification exam. Advisory: Reading Level 1, Writing Level 2, CSCI C070.

CSCI C140 A+ Essential Skills for Computers

A/CSU 2.00 Units

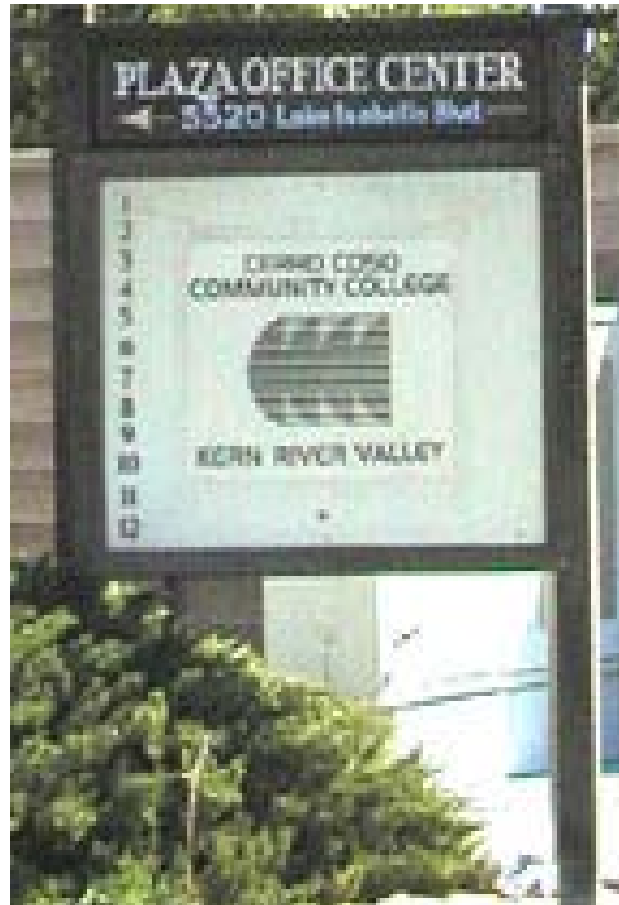
