By offering expanding opportunities in the communities we serve we are building a better, stronger workforce. Our degree and certificate programs help our students build the skills they need to be successful. We are also proud members of our communities, and pride is infectious. By showing our students that we are happy and engaged with our cities we can build a desire to become a part of that success. Community recruitment and retention are not problems that will be solved overnight. But by sharing our pride in our homes we can have a significant impact.

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The Progress Report - Institutional Research

Cerro Coso's Office of Institutional Research (OIR) is the college's go-to source for student data and research needs. We provide data for planning, program review, enrollment and retention, student equity and achievement, and much more. We are also happy to work with faculty, staff, committees, and departments on ad hoc requests. Recent requests have ranged from survey support for SEAC, contact lists for Library and NextUp, data verification for Financial Aid, and customized research for Athletics. Some of the goals of OIR are to provide actionable data to help the college make data-informed decisions and to communicate the results of our research to appropriate bodies.

This month marks the return of The Progress Report, a way to provide the college's internal and external communities with a regular report on the progress the college is making on its mission and institutional priorities. The first Progress Report since its return will be on the overall results for the Fall 2022 First Time Degree Seeking Student Cohort.

The First-Time Degree-Seeking Student Cohort Dashboard is updated annually by the KCCD Institutional Research Office. It was originally developed as part of the district's entry into the Achieving the Dream network in 2013. This dashboard (originally a report known as Elements of Student Success) compiles a variety of performance data points, mostly short-term measures that focus on student success in the first two semesters. It also allows the colleges to compare how it is doing in a variety of ways, including the five most recent cohorts for trends.

The Fall 2022 Cohort data was recently made available and here is how Cerro Coso fared overall:

Notice that Cerro Coso is up, both over 1 year and over the past 5 years, in most metrics. Great work, everyone!

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California Community Colleges Implement ID.me Partnership



Online Textbook Collection Keeps Growing



Students needing to access their textbooks now have an extra option, thanks to the library's Online Textbook collection! The Controlled Digital Lending (CDL) model allows the library to digitize textbooks for which there are no available OER or eBook options and house them in an Online Textbook platform.

An online textbook functions as a digital analog of a physical textbook. For example, only one student may view it at a time. A robust "waiting room" system helps everyone have equal time with each textbook.

With help from student workers Aria Ayres and Olivia Patin, library staff have been tirelessly scanning and adding reserve textbooks to the new collection since January of 2023. With over 120 textbooks digitized in various subjects so far, students have viewed Online Textbook titles 8,507 times and individual chapters a whopping 16,924 times! This ever-growing collection is helping improve equitable access to a quality education for all.
