In first year of foreign language courses, all of the major parts of speech are covered. In the first semester much of the emphasis is on learning techniques for acquiring new vocabulary, understanding difficult concepts such as declensions, moods and tenses, irregular verbs such as stem-changers, and at least one other tense. Students who have not completed a college level equivalent of Latin 102, or two years of high school Latin, or some equivalent such as a study abroad program, would be unprepared and unable to successfully integrate themselves into the classroom.
