| 03/07/2014 | CC Associate in Arts Degree in Anthropology for Transfer | An Associate in Arts Degree in Anthropology for Transfer prepares students for transfer to the CSU system to earn a baccalaureate in Anthropology and its subfields, Archaeology, Biological Anthropology, Cultural Anthropology, and Linguistic Anthropology. Anthropology teaches students to think critically about humans worldwide, their biology, and their culture. Upon successful completion of the program students will be able to apply anthropological principles to the understanding of human cultural and biological variation, compare and contrast major theoretical perspectives in anthropology, and evaluate cross-cultural data using the scientific method. These skills can be applied to careers in anthropology, forensics, law, business, cultural resource management, and human services. To complete the degree, students must fulfill both of the following requirements: A. Completion of 60 semester units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following: -The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education-Breadth Requirements. -Minimum of 19 semester units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the Kern Community College District Board of Trustees. B. Attainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. C. Completion in all courses for the major or area of emphasis must be a "C" or better. A "P" (Pass) grade is not an acceptable grade for courses in the major. | This proposal is for the creation of a new AA-T degree in Anthropology at Cerro Coso.
